

REPORT OF THE REGIONAL EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT May 2015 to October 2015

As we all know, Canadians were at a critical point in our political landscape just a few short weeks ago. As we headed to the polls in the recent federal election, Canadians were determined to defeat the Conservative Government and bring an end to the Harper era. A clear message for change was sent to Ottawa, change that PSAC members have needed for far too long.

Efforts in the BC Region over the summer months focused on the October 19 election date and PSAC members, along with our affiliate sisters and brothers, rallied together, organized events and mobilized to effect the change we wanted to see in Ottawa. Members understood they needed to be involved; they needed to be part of the movement that will bring back the protection of workers' rights, restore public services and ensure respect for all Canadians. While the wave that hit Ottawa was more red than orange, we can all agree that it washed out much of what was wrong in Parliament. And – hopefully – this new government will deliver on their promise for a new tide of change that our country so desperately needs.

It's true; we lost several strong labour MPs through the course of this election. However, I'm confident we haven't seen the last of them. I salute their courage and tenacity in their respective campaigns and offer my thanks for all they were able to achieve on our behalves.

And to my fellow sisters and brothers: I cannot be more proud of the work you did for this election. I'm proud of those who picked up a placard or a lawn sign, those who attended mobilization events, those who knocked on members' doors, those who talked with family and friends about our stake in this election, and above all those who voted to stop the cuts and elected a government that respects public services and the workers who deliver them. Together we were an undeniable force that could not be ignored and our success is directly attributed to the efforts of members. For that I am not only proud, but thankful as well.



After almost a decade of Conservative rule we are now faced with a new era. The new Liberal government has a strong mandate for change. That change needs to include restoring public services and building a positive relationship with the federal public service. Over the course of the election campaign the Liberals made many commitments to Canadians and to federal public sector workers – including the restoration of our bargaining rights and the repeal or re-examination of anti-union legislation like Bill C-4, C-525 and C-377. They also promised to re-open the Kitsilano Coast Guard Station and Veterans Affairs Offices, and said they would improve the quality of all the public services Canadians need and deserve. The new government must act on these promises without delay and I look forward to holding them to their word.

Political Action

PSAC BC Federal Election Membership Engagement Plan - “I’m Voting For...”

As part of our regional action plan, the BC Region developed a plan to engage as many PSAC BC members as possible in the federal election and in the related public services issues. Our hope was that this plan would move members further along the spectrum of engagement and help us target members who would be willing to work directly on our member-to-member campaign.

In terms of the public services issues, we identified eleven issues we believed would resonate with members, which overlapped with the CLC’s broader Better Choice campaign, including:

Workers’ Rights	Marine Safety	Food Safety
Childcare	Healthcare	Veterans
Public Services (job cuts)	The Environment	Human Rights
Employment Insurance	Retirement Security	

Our membership engagement plan rolled out during National Public Services Week in June. That week was selected because our action plan also included a provincial week of action, which we intended to use to ‘kick off’ the campaign.

During summer outreach activities and at membership events, we asked PSAC members to select one of these issues – or one they choose themselves – and pledge to vote, using the issue as a catalyst or starting point (i.e. “I’m voting for public services”, “I’m voting for safety”, “I’m voting for food safety”, “respect”, “my children”, “Canada”, etc.). Members were then encouraged to make this pledge both online at a campaign website and in person by using placards that we provided: one for each issue and one blank one they can fill in using their own words.

As part of this regional plan, we used a campaign website designed to gauge interest and gather information from respondents. Members were invited to visit the website and take the vote pledge and share their area(s) of interest. After hearing from members, we were able to plug them in to the regional plan wherever they felt most

comfortable.

Since the campaign release, we received a lot of positive feedback on the messaging. Members quickly embraced the campaign, realizing all too well the consequences of another Conservative Government in Ottawa.

Area Councils and activists in BC took on eight priority ridings in the province and organized member-to-member phone banks and door knocking activities in those areas. Canvass teams were active in Metro Vancouver, the Interior, Northeast BC, the Fraser Valley, and on Vancouver Island. Across the province, the response from both the members doing the canvassing and from the members being canvassed was extremely positive.

Vote to Stop the Cuts Campaign

During the pre-writ period) the PSAC launched its nationwide campaign to raise awareness about the impact of the cuts to public services and to encourage Canadians to consider these issues before casting their votes in the federal election. The “Vote to Stop the Cuts” campaign included billboards, posters, newspaper and radio ads, and targeted web and social media content. The campaign focused on cuts to key services that have affected Canadians since the Conservative Government came into power: support for veterans, border security, search and rescue, Employment Insurance, environmental protection, and food safety.

In terms of our social media presence, the campaign video has already received well over 1.9M combined views on Facebook and YouTube. In addition, the national Facebook page quadrupled its number fans in the first three weeks of the campaign and now has over 27,000 fans, which is more than any other Canadian union. The PSAC also purchased ad banners for web viewers, and those banners have been seen over 4.5 million times already.

Regionally, the pre-writ campaign ads ran in major Vancouver newspapers as well as smaller newspaper markets in Victoria and Kamloops. Ads were also placed in 24 Black Press local papers across the province in the last week of July. Radio ad space was purchased on province-wide news radio station CKNW.

Billboards were also erected in Greater Vancouver and Victoria areas before the writ was dropped. Through the Region’s election campaign plan, a particular focus was directed at generating a large social media presence through the PSAC BC Facebook page and through additional Facebook advertising, which has been very successful.

Leadership Tour

As many members are aware, part of the union's political action strategy is to have the union's leadership travel the country and meet with members face-to-face to talk about the election and our issues. This summer Leadership Tour had several stops in BC: in July NEVP Chris Aylward, UNDE President John MacLennan, UNDE Executive Vice-President June Winger and I attended a number of meetings on Vancouver Island.

Following the Vancouver Island meetings, NEVP Chris Aylward and I also attended a couple membership meetings in Vancouver.

Treasury Board Bargaining: Regional Mobilization Events

Across the BC Region our members, along with other federal public sector unions (including PIPSC and CAPE) and labour-friendly politicians, have been coming together on the 19th of the month to show the Employer and the public that we want healthier workplaces and better public services for all Canadians.

Given that June 19 coincided with both National Public Services Week (NPSW) and Treasury Board bargaining, the BC Region decided to hold a week of action rather than a single day of action on the 19th. This gave members the autonomy to schedule events and actions at times that best suited their members:



On June 15, a few Regional Council members conducted a day-long plant-gate of various worksites in the Metro Vancouver area. They handed out 'Respect' buttons and talked with members about the NPSW boycott. They also encouraged members to attend member-organized events later in the week, including the large rally on June 19. The response from members was good: many were aware of the boycott and were in strong support of it.

On June 17 the Vancouver and District Area Council held their annual public services softball tournament as a boycott event for NPSW. This event also provided an opportunity for members to come together and speak out against Bill C-59 and the Conservative Government.

That same day, members in Nanaimo held a lunchtime rally to speak out against the Bill C-59 and mark the countdown to the federal election. Members had t-shirts made up for the event that read "ONE VOTE COUNTS," which communicates the need for all Canadians to vote in the upcoming election to bring the change in Ottawa that we need.

On June 19, the Victoria Area Council hosted their annual softball tournament for members as an alternative NPSW event. I attended the tournament in the morning and saw firsthand how engaged members are and how determined they were to see a change on October 19.

As mentioned above, a large rally was held downtown Vancouver at Library Square on June 19 during the lunch hour. Members who work in the downtown core came together to rally against the current government and their attempt to infringe on our Charter-protected right to free collective bargaining. Together with members from PSAC, PIPSC, CAPE as well as CUPE and BCGEU (the provincial public sector union) we sent a clear message to the federal government: “Respect our rights! Respect the Charter! Respect our contracts! Respect public services! And watch out: we’re voting in October.”

Speakers at the rally included Fin Donnelly, NDP MP for New Westminster-Coquitlam and Port Moody; Marco Angeli, CEIU National President; Garth Mullins, President of CAPE Local 301; Karen Hall, PIPSC; Aaron Ekman, BC Federation of Labour Secretary Treasurer; and myself. Members of the FB bargaining unit organized a plant-gate and mobilization activity in downtown Vancouver during the lunch hour on October 8. The group reached out to the BC Federation of Labour and asked them to participate as well. I also joined the group at this event and spoke about bargaining, accommodation and the arming initiative, sick leave, and – of course – the importance of voting in the federal election.

I’d like to thank each of the Treasury Board bargaining team members in BC. Over the summer months they have not only attended bargaining events; they have also been involved and engaged in our political action events across the province and have participated in member-to-member campaigning. Without their leadership and support our mobilization efforts would not have been as successful as they were.

NPSW Activities

This year’s NPSW was probably one of most successful weeks we’ve had. As reported above, there were an unprecedented number of events that took place with record numbers in terms of participation. Moreover, in addition to participation by PSAC members, this year members of PIPSC and CAPE joined in the activities as well.

Our growing schedule of event and attendance numbers demonstrates that we are well on way of carrying forward the idea of boycotting Employer-organized celebrations until such time as we have an Employer that supports and respects the work our members perform. It’s hoped that we will resume the NPSW celebrations in the future, once there is a change in the Employer and our work is valued again.

UVAE BBQ in Kelowna

On July 11, UVAE and PSAC BC partnered together to sponsor and host a community BBQ in Kelowna for members, veterans, armed service personnel, and their families. As you may recall, Kelowna was one of the communities affected by the closure of a

Veterans Affairs Office. With the closure of the nine offices across the country, front line services have been dramatically reduced for veterans and claim processing time has increased significantly – especially in the areas where the offices were closed.

The aim of the community event was to focus attention on the struggles veterans and their families face as a result of the cuts to Veterans Affairs imposed by the Conservative Government, to acknowledge the sacrifices service men and women have made for all Canadians and show our support for them, and to call on the government to reopen the offices.

UVAE Press Conference on Cuts to Veterans' Services



In addition to the Kelowna BBQ, a second event was organized with UVAE to bring greater public attention to the cuts at Veterans Affairs: on August 25, a joint press conference was held in Victoria with UVAE President Carl Gannon, myself, and veterans Robyn Young and her mother Pearl Osmond.

Together we spoke about the impact of the cuts on the lives of veterans and pressed for a moratorium on cuts to Veterans Affairs along with the re-opening of the nine Veterans Affairs offices that were closed in 2013 and 2014.

As you may recall, Robyn and Pearl were featured in one of the video testimonials the

PSAC released this past spring (available at <http://bit.ly/vets-robyn>). Robyn is 24 years old and served in the Royal Canadian Navy for eight years, until a brain tumor and an unnecessary surgery left her with permanent double vision, constant vertigo and nausea. In the video, Robyn and Pearl spoke about how the closure of the Windsor office meant they had to drive six hours' return to London. They have since re-located to Victoria, where they are close to a Veterans Affairs office and can received the veterans' services they need.

Rally at Conservative Party BBQ

Members in Victoria organized a rally at the gates to Fort Rodd Hill National Park for July 27 after they discovered the Conservative Party was hosting a fundraising BBQ at the venue with Treasury Board President Tony Clement. Along with PSAC members, I attended the event to 'greet' Mr. Clement with our Stop Harper signs and campaign posters. While we never saw Mr. Clement directly, Conservative BBQ-goers were well

aware of our presence and heard our views on Bill C-59, Division 20 and what we planned to do on October 19.

Kamloops BBQ

In late August, members organized a BBQ for members and their families at Riverside Park in Kamloops. Federal election candidates from the four major parties were also invited to attend and to speak about their parties' plans for federal public services. Two of the four candidates attended, who showed their support for public services.

I attended the BBQ along with a few other members of the BC Regional Council. We used the BBQ as an opportunity to talk with members and to encourage them to increase their involvement with the Union and perhaps work toward the establishment of an area council for the Kamloops area. As part of our trip to the Southern Interior, the Regional Council members and I also conducted a couple worksite tours in the area and met with members in their worksite.

Summer Outreach Events

June marked the start of our summer outreach activities, part of our regional election campaign. Across the province, members participated in several community events to talk with the public about the impact of the cuts, to garner support for our issues and to encourage Canadians to vote this October. Largely organized through the Area Councils, some of the summer events included Seafest in Prince Rupert, National Aboriginal Day in Vancouver and Terrace, Car Free Day in Vancouver, Canada Day and Labour Day events across the Region, and the Pride Parades and Festivals in Surrey, Victoria, Prince George, Abbotsford and Vancouver.



One other major annual summer festival is the Surrey Fusion Festival. This event differed slightly from past years in that we coordinated with BC Federation of Labour and its Affiliates to have a larger presence at the festival. With the addition of members from the BCFED, BCGEU, COPE378, CUPW and HEU, we had a greater impact with the public. Together we talked with the festival attendees about the importance of voting this fall and electing a government that supports quality public services.

I'd like to acknowledge the hard work of all the members involved in the summer outreach events. Without their involvement and commitment, we would not have had the large presence in the community that we had this summer and we would not have been able to engage with the public as successfully.

'Harperman' Sing-Along Rally

Members from CAPE, PIPSC, and PSAC teamed up to hold another pre-election rally in downtown Vancouver on September 17. The rally took place at Library Square in Vancouver where the Employer got a front row seat to our Region's group rendition of Tony Turner's popular political hit, "Harperman." Dozens of voices strong, the sing-along gave members another opportunity to show their support for unions and clearly state our intentions for October 19: "Harperman, it's time for you to go!"

Telephone Town Hall

The BC Region held a membership telephone town hall meeting on September 29, which was open to all members in BC and focused on the federal election. Speakers for the call included PSAC National President Robyn Benson, BC Federation of Labour President Irene Lanzinger and myself. Over 1,500 members were on the line at the peak of the call with 300 remaining until the very end. The questions received from the members were thoughtful and showed just how engaged members were around the election and their desire to elect a new government. More telling is that 100% of the participants on the call indicated that they would vote on October 19.

Building Alliances and Supporting the Labour Community



Solidarity with COPE 378

In June, 70 members of COPE Local 378 were locked out by their employer, the BC Automobile Association (BCAA). Now, over five months into the dispute, there still doesn't appear to be any resolution in sight.

To demonstrate our solidarity with these members, we have joined them at their picket line. And in August we joined them at a rally on a Highway 1 overpass in Burnaby, marking two months since the members had been locked out. It is simply unacceptable for BCAA to treat their employees so poorly. I wanted the locked out members to know that they have the full support of the PSAC in this dispute.

Golden Tree Monument Unveiling

After many years in the making, on October 3 the Golden Tree Monument was unveiled in its permanent home in the Friendship Garden in Abbotsford, BC. Motivation for the monument began after three women were killed in a tragic accident while on their way to work in 2007. The women were packed into a poorly maintained and unsafe

work van along with fourteen other farm workers. (See www.goldentree.ca/#strip4 for more information.)

The BC Federation of Labour and its Affiliates were strong supporters for the establishment of this monument and of the province-wide review that stemmed from these senseless deaths. I attended the unveiling on behalf of the PSAC BC Region, who also contributed to the monument.

The Golden Tree will stand as a fitting legacy to Sarbjit Kaur Sidhu, Amarjit Kaur Bal, and Sukhvinder Kaur Punia. It will also serve as a monument to all farm workers, recognition of the important work they do for our communities, and as a powerful reminder of the consequences of unsafe work. I encourage members to visit the monument if they are in the Fraser Valley.

Education

Regional Education Schedule

This fall our regional education course schedule includes a couple advanced courses as well as some specialized one-day training opportunities for members. In October we'll be hosting the new Advanced Representation Training for Stewards (ARTS) course, which builds on the former Advanced Steward Training. The four-day ARTS course will look at various routes for engaging members in helping them to resolved workplace issues. Using case studies, participants will deepen their knowledge of the processes and legal framework of grievance handling and what is needed to support the PSAC's representation of members at all levels of the grievance process, up to arbitration/adjudication. This December we'll be offering the Advanced Duty to Accommodate course, which was last offered in 2012.

In terms of the specialized training sessions, this September a one-day Steward Training session was offered in Richmond with the theme "Building the Union through Steward Work." The purpose of the training was to improve Stewards' skills in the areas of mobilizing and organizing members and communicating with members in their locals. The training builds upon the previous member-to-member engagement from the We Are All Affected campaign and helps Stewards discuss the current federal election with members in their locals.

Also related to the federal election, the Region offered Political Action training. Two offerings were scheduled in BC – one in Vancouver (held in July) and one in Victoria (held in September). The two-day courses were designed to provide members with a solid political foundation, from reviewing the current government's policies and actions and their impact, to strategizing about communities, to engaging, motivating, and connecting with fellow PSAC members. On the second day of the course, members had a choice of practicing their skills by having member-to-member conversation either in person or over the phone. By the end of the course participants were equipped to continue political action into the fall and through the campaign period.

Also in September, the BC Region offered Violence Prevention (Anti-Bullying) training.

The two-day course was designed to provide information and better enforcement tools on the Canada Labour Code Part II requirements on violence prevention as well as its applicable regulations.

Finally, members in BC will also have the opportunity to take the Members Facilitation Training course (formerly Alliance Facilitator Network Training) in January 2016. This course will provide members with the training to facilitate ‘lunch and learns’ and small informative meetings.

Regional Negotiations

Several regional units are currently in negotiations. In July notice to bargain was served for Globe Ground Fuelers at Vancouver Airport. The Globe Ground supervisors, a separate bargaining unit, starting their negotiations in April. However, efforts were taken to get these two units in sync so they could increase their bargaining power. Since coordinating their bargaining timelines, the group has had some trouble with the Employer and decided to file for conciliation. The earliest possible date for a strike and/or lockout would be late December or early January. The unit at IMP Comox also started their negotiations. However, they have also trouble with the Employer in terms of receiving information, and, at the time of this writing the team is considering filing an unfair labour practice complaint.

The Seal Cove Commissionaires in Prince Rupert are also in collective bargaining. They are however currently enjoying a statutory freeze with no concessions. That means if they go to the table, there will be concessions. Therefore, progress has been slow there as well.

First National Health Authority – DCL 22000

In July, representatives from the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA), PIPSC, and PSAC (DCL 22000) gathered to sign their first collective agreement together after more than two years of negotiations. As you’ll recall, this DCL was established when workers at Health Canada were transferred to the FNHA in BC. The bargaining process for this new unit was challenging from the start; however, through perseverance an historic agreement was achieved.

In keeping with the FNHA’s approach and wellness philosophy based on First Nations teachings, the new collective agreements and their negotiations incorporated unprecedented inclusion of First Nations perspectives, values and sensibilities within



their terms. This agreement demonstrates that recognition of First Nation sovereignty is compatible with fair collective bargaining. We are proud to support both progressive change in First Nations health care delivery and the workers who deliver those services, and we look forward to working collaboratively to achieve improved First Nations health outcomes.

I'd like to thank the bargaining team and staff for their hard work and the members for their unwavering support during this unique round of bargaining. Members should be proud of their solidarity and hard work and can look forward to a contract that enhances working conditions and recognizes First Nations culture and heritage.

Regional

BC Regional Triennial Convention Planning

In early July, the REVP Office conducted a lot of the preliminary work for selecting the 2017 Regional Convention venue and dates. An RFP process was put together for potential hotels identified in the Greater Vancouver Area and site tours at number of the hotels that responded to the RFP. The facility that prepared the best total package for the BC Regional Convention is the Fairmont Hotel Vancouver. The dates for the convention have been confirmed for June 16-18, 2017.

Regional Health & Safety Conference

The PSAC BC Regional Health and Safety Conference is taking place November 14-15, 2015 in Richmond under the theme, "When crazy stuff happens, are we safe at work?" The conference objective is to create a forum for Health and Safety activists to reflect upon, discuss and take action on current health and safety issues such as: violence and bullying awareness, mental health in the workplace, regressive labour laws Bill C-4, improving return to work outcomes and health and safety fundamentals.

National

National Triennial Convention

PSAC activists from coast to coast to coast gathered together in Quebec City from April 27 to May 1 to attend the PSAC's National Triennial Convention. Included in the group were 70 members from BC, all of whom were active and vocal on the floor. I'd like to thank the delegates and observers who attended from the BC Region. Together, the BC delegates were able to effect the change they wanted to see and advocated strongly for issues that will impact the Region. I am proud of every one of them, and I believe the BC Region is in good stead head into the PSAC's next fiscal cycle.

While at Convention, I had the honour of chairing the General Committee at Convention and working with the superb members and staff named to the Committee. The Committee worked diligently to prepare for Convention, but this work could not have been accomplished without the strong support from the staff technical advisors and admin. On behalf of the members of the General Committee, I'd like to thank the staff for all their hard work.

As I stated on the floor of Convention, the 2015 PSAC National Triennial Convention marked my last as a delegate. Already I know that I will miss the debate on convention floor and the camaraderie between members. However, I also know the great work of this Union will carry on for years to come, especially under the strong leadership of the activists who were in Quebec City.

As we head into the next cycle, I look forward to seeing us focus the energy generated at Convention into action. Upon leaving convention I saw PSAC members more united and determined than ever to defend workers' rights, public services and human rights.



AEC and NBoD

Following the PSAC National Triennial Convention, the AEC met several times in the fall and early fall, both as standalone meetings and in conjunction with NBoD meetings. The NBoD met twice since Convention with a third meeting scheduled for late October. An update on the October NBoD meeting will be provided at the November Regional Council meeting. Since Convention, much of the focus of the AEC and NBoD has been on the federal election and resolutions passed at Convention. Now with the election behind us, we will begin looking at our strategic plan for moving forward into the next three-year cycle.

Report to the B.C. Regional Council

Since the April in person meeting of the PSAC BC Regional Council so much change has happened, most notably the elimination of Stephen Harper.

The last six months has been a full push, a whole focus, on this achievement. As Metro Vancouver Coordinator, I participated in sight visits and plant gates at the Vancouver Airport, Purolator, Service Canada, IRB, CIC, and CRA, Fisheries, and other departments in the Metro Vancouver Area.

Summer events this year were no less busy then last – I participated and volunteered in Aboriginal Day, Pride events in Vancouver and Fraser Valley, the Area Council BBQ, Fusion Festival, and the Aldergrove parade. I also coordinated the PSAC Labour Day participation at Swangard Stadium with the BC Federation of Labour.

During this timeframe I was also afforded the opportunity to represent the PSAC at the Governor General Leadership Conference. Participation in this event was challenging and I provided a full report to the PSAC National President Robyn Benson, about my experience. One incident of note includes being forced to sit through a presentation by senior officials at GoldCorp where they tried telling our group, made up of mainly private sector business officials, how their company adheres to human rights standards internationally. I called them liars and promptly chose not to remain on the rest of the facility tour of a gold mine. They were happy to escort me back to the dorm rooms we were staying at. Highlights include a two hour speech by the amazing Canadian Astronaut Chris Hatfield about leadership and mentorship.

In my capacity as a national officer for CEIU, I was also able to travel the region, in particular the Okanagan/Kootnays and Vancouver Island. I participated and helped coordinate mobilization efforts in these areas. In June, CEIU BC/YT held a meeting with 15 of our regional leadership, attended by Bob Jackson and Patrick Bragg from PSAC Regional Union Office. This assisted our leaders in understanding PSAC's approach to political action and mobilization, and often at the centre of mobilization events in the region CEIU members could be found leading the charge. I want to thank both for their support of our activists and their efforts in mobilization.

Following our last meeting, I have become the Chair of the Regional Political Action Committee for PSAC BC Regional Council. A separate report will be provided. However, I want to thank activists in Metro Vancouver, specifically Bill Fleming, Aaron Chang, and Cheryl Onema, who time and again could be relied on assist in mobilization efforts and monthly rallies in support of collective agreements and a change in governments.

I was also elected at the last regional council meeting to represent the PSAC at the BC Federation of Labour alongside our REVP Bob Jackson. I attended my first meeting

recently, and had a good opportunity to network with other executive officers as we joined BCAA locked out workers on the picket line following the meeting. A couple of noteworthy things from this meeting was a concern brought forward from BCGEU regarding the “Better at Homes” program and the United Way of the Lower Mainland, which is administering programs through the use of volunteers – work which used to be funded provincially and done by



BCGEU members. For now, we are asked to be advised of their concerns. The other issue was around participation in community groups where the BCNU is member of. As many of us are aware, BCNU has been removed from the BC Fed for raiding of HEU members. As a member of the regional International Solidarity committee for PSAC, I wanted to highlight that CoDevelopment Canada has chosen not to accept donations from BCNU until they work in solidarity with the labour movement.

I’ve also been participating on two cabinet committees of the United Way of the Lower Mainland. This involves going to early morning breakfast meetings to meet with industry leaders from various sectors, or as part of the labour cabinet to discuss the role labour plays with the United Way. I have had ongoing discussions with REVP Bob Jackson about our role with the United Way and hope to provide more information in my next report to the Region.

I continue to actively participate in the Vancouver Area Council, Human Rights Committee, and Women’s Committee.

Finally, I took three months of leave from work in order to be able to more fully participate in the federal election and focus on my union work. I spent much time during the election period volunteering for Fin Donnelly in Coquitlam-Port Moody. We had a very successful election night, with eleven PSAC members as well as REVP Bob Jackson volunteering on election day to help pull the vote. Thank you to all the members who regularly door knocked and volunteered for Fin – he asked me to provide his gratitude for the role our union played in his victory and I am sure he will deliver personal thank you’s.

While I am not thrilled with a Liberal majority government, I have to say the morning after the election I felt like we were no longer at war with our employer. Moving forward, as we begin looking to the next Regional Triennial Convention for the PSAC BC Region, and decision making on structure, bylaws, and leadership, there is a lot of work that can be done in preparation to ensure a fruitful convention. I look forward to working with activists across the region. As the National Officer Coordinator alternate on Regional Council, I have proposed a survey of National Officers to find out what their priorities are, and what they think PSAC's priorities should be as we head into a new era in the federal public sector. One area I'd like to improve in is my familiarity with our members working for separate employers, and hope to build bridges in those locals.

Report to the B.C. Regional Council

The past six months has been busy leading up to the federal election. During that time, I've been attending the Fraser Valley Labour Council monthly executive meetings and the monthly general meetings. By attending those meeting, I've been able to promote to the labour movement in the area as well as the upcoming election and what it could mean if Harper was re-elected as Prime Minister, running the government for the next four years.

I also approach the local candidates from all parties in my riding and asked them what their priorities are and where they stand on public services. When I spoke with the candidates, I explained what I do for a living and how important that work is to Canadians as well as the value of the work performed by other public services workers, especially the work that happens behind the scenes that public does not see front and centre.

We had our Fraser Valley Labour Council annual Labour Day picnic, which was well attended and continues to get bigger each year. When talking to members of the public, including some strong Conservative Party supporters, they would question our motives for the 'STOP Harper' signs. However, when it came to an individual's grandkids, they had no problem with them going into the free bouncy castle provided by union members.

On September 19, the Fraser Valley Labour Council hosted a BBQ for members. The BBQ provided an opportunity for members to come together to talk about the cuts to public services, to encourage members to get out and vote, to help out on a candidate's campaign in their area, and/or to help out on election day.

A lot of our members did get out and vote on October 19, some of whom have never voted before. However, given what the Harper Government did to the public services and they shaped Canada as a whole, members wanted change and got out to vote.

I think the Liberal's majority win came a surprise to everyone. With all things said and done, I think that it was a win for PSAC because we were successful in getting Harper out of office, and most likely out of federal politics.

But of course it is not a time to relax; we still need to pressure the new Liberal majority government to repeal Bills put forward by the Conservative Party that are clearly against the Constitution.

Report to the B.C. Regional Council

BC Regional Coordinator for Racially Visible Members For Period March 16 to October 26, 2015

Community Engagement

- International Day to Eliminate Racial Discrimination:

My mom and I participated in the 8th annual community march to mark International Day to Eliminate Racial Discrimination. It was great to see Sister Ruby Langan and her young daughter there. I would like to encourage more PSAC members especially from the HR committee to be at community marches like this. I see community events such as this as a way of connecting in with our families, friends, and neighbours as we show the strength of our union leadership.

- David Suzuki Blue Dot Movement Meeting, Surrey:

The Surrey Blue Dot Movement committee presented to the Surrey's Environmental Advisory Sustainability Committee and the Surrey Mayor and Surrey Council regarding a municipal declaration on environmental rights in June and July 2015 respectively. The campaign in Surrey has gained momentum since their June presentation. We know that municipal leaders pay attention when Blue Dot supporters show big numbers and community support - this has made all the difference in many other municipalities across the country. Resolution 145 Regional Racially Visible Conference, cost \$600,000 (ongoing cost)

The Committee recommends concurrence in Resolution GEN-145 which reacts as follows:

Whereas PSAC recognizes the importance of regional lens on PSAC priorities and actions; and

Whereas PSAC is seeing an increasing number of racially visible members across the North and in the communities; and

Whereas PSAC has made provisions for the establishment of regional rv committees; and

Whereas there is currently no provision for rv members to maintain links and connect between national rv conferences

Be it resolved that PSAC allocate necessary resources and funds to establish regional racially visible conference

Update on the PSAC Regional RV Conference:

The seven PSAC Regional RV Coordinators had a teleconference call on October 14 to discuss preliminary stage on the conference with the REVP from Ontario and NCR PSAC Staff. Ontario will be the first region to hold the first conference among the seven regions. It will be a two and a half day long conference with workshops and guest speakers. At this time, all Regions will discuss theme and what kind of workshop they would like to have at the conference.



- Racially Visible Caucus Meeting: At our September 19th RV caucus meeting, we had a discussion on what we would like to have at our specific regional conference. Some of the things discussed at this meeting included about organizing a CLIFF (Canadian Labour International Film Festival) for November, organizing the 5th annual December 6th candlelight vigil in Surrey, the first December 6th candlelight

vigil in Abbotsford, political action/helping with the Oct 19 Federal Election. I am pleased to share that a core group of RV members have voluntarily come forward from the RV meetings held to date. I want to thank them for their contribution and coming forward to assist with this caucus.


- May Asian Heritage Month Celebration:

This was the first time ever that an event was organized in Vancouver by a PSAC member. With help and support from Laurie Antonin (CLC National Anti-Racism and Human Rights National Representative) and Marie Clarke Walker (CLC National Executive Vice President), I organized an Asian Heritage Month Celebration on Thursday May 14 at the Unifor Hall in Vancouver. There were contributions from CLC, BCFED, PSAC, UNIFOR, BCGEU and UFCW and big thank you to these union affiliates and their members (including our very own PSAC Racially Visible members and Aboriginal Representative) who volunteered at the event and helped make this a successful event. I would also like to thank T&T Supermarket and Black Bond Bookstore from the Surrey Central City Mall for their generous donations of snacks and books for lucky draws.

- With reference from a PSAC Acting Regional Representative who was at the event, a report provided below on the Asian Heritage Event on 2015 05 14:
- There were 60 participants with 6 kids who enjoyed a feast of an entire roast pig generously donated by UFCW and various offerings from Vietnamese, Philippines, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese cuisine.
- The evening began with an Elder who sang a welcome followed by the Mayor of New Westminster, Jonathan Cote. Mr. Cote mentioned that while New Westminster currently has one of the most diverse communities in Metro Vancouver it did not always have a reputation for inclusivity. Marie Clark Walker, CLC National Executive

Vice President spoke of the need to acknowledge the complicity in organized labour not having been the most welcoming to racialized workers. However, through the tireless work of union leaders such as Winnie Ng, strides had been made to be more inclusive. She noted specifically that only when the past is acknowledged, even as it may be troubled, it must be named. She did speak to the “Terrorism Bill” (Bill C-51) and the insidious over reach to snare anyone protesting environmental, foreign and labour issues. REVP Bob Jackson thanked Jennifer for all her work in the organization of the event.

- Five 2 minute clips were shown from: <https://www.knowledge.ca/program/working-people-history-labour-british-columbia> Each clip featured a community of workers and their struggles for better pay or union recognition, whether it was Japanese fisherman in the 1920s or South Asian field workers in the 1970s. The clips were followed by a four-person panel who spoke on a wide range of topics. A professor from SFU gave a history of Chinese workers in Canada from the 1800s onward. A member of Migrante Canada spoke to the transparent courting of the South Asian and Philippine communities by the Conservatives through inviting the leaders of each country. The speaker representing Greater Vancouver Japanese Canadian Citizens’ Association spoke to the need to know history in order not to repeat the mistakes of the past, especially in light of Bill C-51 and its attempt to demonize certain communities. The fourth speaker, a poet, read her poetry. When asked about discrimination she indicated it is hard to speak to each incident but one must try to alert others to discrimination as it occurs. The evening lasted till 9:30 and there was good participant interaction. The kids were entertained by face painting offered by a PSAC member Tracy Shudo and lots had their photos taken with new friends at the photo booth. We look forward to organizing yet another event in 2016.

The two inquests have consumed the majority of time and conversations. Every year the budget is done up and the Government tells the Board how much it can or cannot increase the budget. WCB policy consultations were discussed and all are available online. Other topics covered were the Golden Tree Monument unveiling and the End Workplace Violence project.

Health & Safety Planning Conference Call - June 9, July 28, September 23, October 20 and 27	We have had a number of conference calls regarding the upcoming H&S conference. We had a call for persons who were interested in being on the organizing committee. From there, individuals chose which committee they were interested in and James Little and I placed everyone into the various committees. A theme was established and from there we worked on the agenda. I am looking forward to the conference and feel that we have something for everyone.

Report to the B.C. Regional Council - September 2015


The most recent meeting of the PSAC B.C. National Officers took place on March 13, 2015 in Richmond. The meeting was attended by 12 national officers with 3 guests and 3 staff in attendance. Main agenda items of the national officer meeting included but were not restricted to:

Convention Committees

Given that the PSAC National Triennial Convention was to take place in a few weeks convention committees and convention resolutions dominated the discussions. National Officers present at the meeting and part of convention committees were asked to lead the discussions of committee priorities. National Officers were also asked to bring forward to the meeting whatever resolutions had priority within their respective Components.

BC Fed

Secretary-Treasurer Aaron Ekman addressed the meeting addressing the BCFED lobby in Victoria on privatization, trade and apprenticeship training and the minimum wage campaign.


Activities Since the Last B.C. Regional Council Meeting

Report to the B.C. Regional Council

I would like to apologize for being unable to deliver this report in person. The CEIU national executive meeting has been moved to the same dates.

There can be no doubt that the activists in BC contributed towards the success of progressive candidates in our province. So many of our members participated in the member to member campaign, as well as volunteering directly on NDP campaigns.

In the North, Be worked with Nathan Cullen, Carolyn in the Okanagan/Kootneys organizing phoners in the member to member campaign, in Nanaimo Vanessa ran a zone house for the NDP, in Victoria Nick continued his work with the party, in Fraser Jen worked with Jinny Sims, and in Metro I spent a great deal of time volunteering for Fin Donnelly.

These are just the efforts of the committee members, who all lead by example during this election and worked to engage activists in their respective areas of BC. But it would be impossible to list every member of the region who got involved, in some way, in this federal election. Patrick tells me it's unprecedented – and for once I won't argue with him.

I have to admit I awoke the day after the election feeling as though a weight had been lifted off my shoulders. We are no longer in an all-out war with our employer. However, I am disheartened with the loss of so many progressive MPs across Canada. As many of you are aware, I am not a fan of so called strategic voting. However, the NDP itself needs to reevaluate some of its policy decisions in this election, not the least of which was running a no deficit budget.

As we move forward as a committee, and as a Region, I have some suggestions. The main one being that we take this opportunity as Regional Council members to introduce ourselves to our new MPs, to reacquaint ourselves with returning ones, and I will be making a suggestion that area councils engage in group meetings with the nearest members of JT's cabinet. They should know who we are, they should know that we are engaged with the community and our membership, and they should know that we have every intention of holding them accountable in keeping their promises around the coast guard, the federal public sector, and everything else that directly affects our membership.

Following the federal election, I wrote to the PSAC National President, Robyn Benson, to express some of my concerns with the member-to-member campaign. This Regional Council has already heard my concerns on our last regional conference call, but I did want to celebrate the highlights. We had an amazing add campaign, which the public and labour movement responded to overwhelmingly. The REVPs were very visible in this federal election. And to our REVP, who I had some challenging

discussions with as we held varying views on mobilization efforts during the election, thank you on behalf of the committee and from myself personally, for taking a position in BC and asking our members to view a vote for the NDP as a vote to stop Harper. For those who are unaware, Bob volunteered his time on election day at Fin Donnelly's campaign office, joining 11 other PSAC members who helped pull the vote and bring home a victory in Coquitlam-Port Moody.

Our work certainly isn't over. In my capacity as Nic's alternate National Officer Coordinator, I've presented him with an idea that we poll the national officers in the region to find out what their priorities are going into 2016, and what they think PSAC's priorities should be. I hope we are able to achieve this by our next in person council meeting, and report back to this body on the results. It's important as a region we work closer together in solidarity, both on council and with our components and DCL, so that

we can hold this government accountability and strengthen our ability to protect public services and good jobs.

I also wanted to thank members of council for the level of discussion and debate that we were able to achieve during the election period. A very long federal election means emotions are often heightened and people are just freaking tired. But we had some discussions over email, in person, on the phone, etc, that I feel makes us better able to represent PSAC members.

Water Policy

The “Water Policy” that was put forward from the BC PSAC Environment Committee was passed on PSAC Convention in April 2015.

Establishment of a National Environment Committee

The establishment of an Environment Committee at the PSAC NBoD, which was ruled out of order by the National President during Convention Committee meetings, is still a priority of the BC environment Committee. Brother Bob Jackson brought this forward at the spring meeting of the NBoD and was met with some resistance. It is the Committee’s understanding that this issue will be re-visited at the October NBoD meetings and will likely require a lobby effort through the BC REVP, national officers and component presidents.

BC Water Sustainability Act

The water protection act that was just brought in by the BC government was better than what we had before but it could be made much better. A pretty good synopsis of the act and its strengths and weaknesses can be found at:
